DEBORAH HIRSCH

Now in her 9th season with the Houston Pride Band, Deborah Hirsch is originally from Baltimore, Maryland. She graduated from the University of Kansas with a bachelor's degree in music therapy and music education

and earned a master's degree in music at Texas A&M University-Commerce. She also served in the 312th Army Band in Lawrence, Kansas before moving to Texas.

Retiring after 37 years as a band director in Pasadena, Texas, Deborah enjoyed a successful career in public education. Ms. Hirsch was named "Teacher of the Year" in 2014.

As a participant the Colorado University Conducting Symposium in June 2016 Ms. Hirsch studied under Steve Davis, Dr. Donald McKinney, Dr. Matt Roeder and Dr. Matthew Dockendorf. In June 2019, she attended the Conn-Selmer Institute where she was able to study, consult and collaborate with many of her band idols—Dr. Tim Lautzenheiser, Dr. Paula A. Crider, Frank Troyka, Michael Sweeney and Richard Saucedo. In the 2019, Deborah was honored to direct the Association of Private Lutheran Schools Honor Band and the Texas Region 19 Class CC Band. In November 2021, she was the guest clinician for the Texas Region 19 CCC Band and shared the podium at the Bigger and Brighter Conference of the Pride Bands Alliance.

Deborah is an active clinician, judge, and consultant across the state and is a member of Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, Women Band Directors International, and Texas Music Adjudicators Association.

Ms. Hirsch is also a member of the chancel choir and bell choir at Bering Memorial United Church of Christ and a long time member of Pasadena Little Theater.

DAVID LEA

David Lea is in his eighth season as a member of the Houston Pride Band, and has served as Co-Artistic Director since 2018. Since joining the artistic team, David has conducted the Houston Pride Band at the

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Women Band Directors International conference in 2022 as a featured concert and clinic ensemble, and served on the Artistic Team for the Pride Bands Alliance national conference in 2021. He has also represented HPB as a guest conductor for the Houston Chamber Music Society Wind Project. After bringing two world premiere performances to the HPB Audience in 2023, David is excited to be working with composer JaRod Hall to commission a new work to culminate the band's 45th season.

David is also a founding member of BrassTax, the Houston Pride Band Brass Quintet. BrassTax has performed throughout Houston as a musical ambassador for HPB's outreach initiatives, and will be featured as a guest collaborator this season with Pride Chorus Houston. Outside of BrassTax, David also plays trumpet for the NFL Houston Texans' Deep Steel Thunder.

David currently serves as the Head Band Director and fine arts department chair at Null Middle School in Sheldon ISD. His bands have enjoyed successes at UIL Concert & Sight-Reading Evaluations, and local and regional festivals. As a private trumpet teacher, his students have made Michigan All-state, earned first divisions at regional and state solo & ensemble contests, and had the honor of participating in the Michigan Youth Arts Festival.

David earned bachelor's degrees from Texas A&M and Michigan State University in Psychology and Music Education, respectively. He earned his Master of Music Education from the University of North Texas. His professional memberships include Texas Music Educators and Texas Bandmasters Associations.

Program Notes COMPILED BY THEO HARRISON

AN AMERICAN FANFARE

This dynamic concert opener takes the normally hymnlike strains of *America (My Country 'Tis of Thee)* and incorporates it into a fast and energetic fanfare. The actual melody is stated only once in its entirety. Many liberties are taken with both melodic and harmonic elements of the original, making a breathtaking presentation!

LIKE OUR FATHERS BEFORE US

This powerful composition pays homage to the resilience, dedication, and legacy passed down through generations. *Like Our Fathers Before Us* evokes the spirit of tradition and unity, blending reflective melodies with moments of intensity. Michael Barry's writing captures the essence of honoring those who have come before us, particularly through his use of sweeping lines and dynamic contrasts.

The piece opens with a solemn and reflective theme, representing the foundation laid by past generations. As the music develops, we hear a variety of musical textures that symbolize growth, challenges, and triumphs. The rhythmic pulse throughout the piece represents the persistence and determination of those who continue to forge new paths while honoring their roots.

SELECTIONS FROM LES MISÉRABLES

This landmark musical brought us memorable songs and a moving story, and thanks to the 2012 motion picture is enjoying renewed popularity. Warren Barker's masterful medley captures the depth and power of the original music. Includes: *At the End of the Day, I Dreamed a Dream, Master of the House, On My Own, and Do You Hear the People Sing?*

ETERNAL FLAME

This thrilling and majestic overture by Brian Balmages pays homage to the only eternal flame memorial in the United States dedicated to Medal of Honor recipients. Subtle nods to "America" remind the listener of the incredible sacrifices made by these brave individuals. While the piece is not overtly patriotic, the olympic-style fanfares and stately themes make it more than suitable for such an occasion!

VARIATIONS ON 'AMERICA'

Variations on "America" was originally a composition for organ. Composed in 1891 when Ives was seventeen, it is an arrangement of a traditional tune, known as *My Country, 'Tis of Thee*, and was at the time the de facto anthem of the United States. The variations are a witty, irreverent piece for organ, probably typical of a "silly" teenage phenom like Ives. After a snappy figural variation, we hear a sinuous barbershop setting, a jaunty European cavalry march, a "midway" polonaise, and a scherzo.

THE MARCH OF THE WOMEN

The March of the Women is a song composed by Ethel Smyth in 1910, to words by Cicely Hamilton. It became the official anthem of the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU) and more widely the anthem of the women's suffrage movement throughout the United Kingdom and elsewhere. Activists sang it not only at rallies but also in prison while they were on hunger strike.

BREAD AND ROSES

A powerful march for treble choirs, this fresh arrangement was inspired by women's activism during the first decade of the 20th century. "Bread and Roses" was a political slogan that appeared initially in a speech by Helen Todd and later became the title of a poem by James Oppenheim. Composed by Mimi Fariña in the 1950s, and later recorded by a number of folk singers, the arranger was moved to create this new arrangement as a response to the rash of government sanctions against women's rights in the U.S. and around the world. Ideal for high school, collegiate, and adult community choirs, this is a bold arrangement and strong conversation-starter — a great way to share this important and inspiring story with present-day audiences.

OF OUR NEW DAY BEGUN

Of Our New Day Begun was written to honor nine beautiful souls who lost their lives to a callous act of hatred and domestic terrorism on the evening of June 17, 2015 while worshipping in their beloved sanctuary, the historic Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal

Church (affectionately referred to as "Mother Emanuel") in Charleston, South Carolina. My greatest challenge in creating this work was walking the line between reverence for the victims and their families, and honoring my strong, bitter feelings towards both the perpetrator and the segments of our society that continue to create people like him. I realized that the most powerful musical expression I could offer incorporated elements from both sides of that line - embracing my pain and anger while being moved by the displays of grace and forgiveness demonstrated by the victims' families. The piece is anchored by James and John Johnson's time-honored song, "Lift Every Voice and Sing" (known endearingly as the "Negro National Anthem"), and peppered with blues harmonies and melodies. Singing, stomping, and clapping are also prominent features of this work, as they have always been a mainstay of black music traditions, and the inclusion of the tambourine in these sections is a direct nod to black worship services.

IMAGINE

Imagine is a popular song by the former Beatles member, John Lennon. Orchestrated here for wind orchestra by Japanese arranger Takashi Hoshide, the familiar tune

is taken at a steady pace, allowing for an extended saxophone solo to be placed on top of the arrangement. This arrangement gives the audience a fresh take on one of the twentieth century's most popular songs, written to encourage the listener to imagine a world at peace without the barriers of borders or the divisions of religion and nationality, and to consider the possibility that the focus of humanity should be living a life unattached to material possessions.

LAST DANCE

Originally written for the 1978 film "Thank God It's Friday", Last Dance became an iconic disco hit performed by the legendary Donna Summer. Penned by Paul Jabara, this Grammy and Academy Award-winning song is a perfect blend of heartfelt balladry and upbeat disco rhythms. It captures the emotional intensity of a final night out, moving from a slow, soulful introduction to a high-energy crescendo, making it both a poignant farewell and a joyful celebration. Known for its infectious groove and powerful vocals, Last Dance has become a timeless anthem of the disco era, inspiring audiences to cherish every moment on the dance floor.

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
